

## General Bar Date FAQs

---

### 1. What is a Bar Date?

- As part of the court-supervised process, Mallinckrodt must determine all amounts claimed by various parties to be owed by Mallinckrodt as a result of agreements entered into or services provided prior to Mallinckrodt's Chapter 11 filing date of October 12, 2020.
- To do that, Mallinckrodt sent a notice about the deadline to submit a "Proof of Claim" form. This deadline, known as the "General Bar Date," is the last date on which a Proof of Claim can be filed.
- The Bankruptcy Court has set the General Bar Date for February 16, 2021 at 5:00 pm ET.
- The Governmental Bar Date is April 12, 2021 at 5:00 pm ET.
- It is important to note that the General Bar Date of February 16, 2021 (or April 12, 2021 for governmental entities) does not apply to opioid claims. Opioid claims will be addressed through a separate process.
- If you believe that you have a non-opioid claim that arose before the date of October 12, 2020 that has not been paid, you should consider filing a Proof of Claim.

### 2. Why did I receive a notice in the mail?

- The Chapter 11 reorganization process requires the distribution of certain documents and notices that provide information about Mallinckrodt's restructuring.
- These notices, including the one you received, are being sent to a wide range of Mallinckrodt's stakeholders, including current and former vendors, employees and customers, among others.
- Receiving this notice does not mean that you have a claim or that Mallinckrodt or the Court believes that you have a claim.
- If you do not believe you have a claim, you do not need to do anything in response to this notice.

### 3. What is a "claim"?

- "Claim" is a defined term in the U.S. Bankruptcy Code. In general, "claim" is defined as a right to a payment.
- Since claim is a legal term, we cannot advise you as to how it directly applies to your situation. If you have any questions, you should consult legal counsel.

### 4. What is a "Proof of Claim"?

- A "Proof of Claim" is the official form that a creditor or other interested party must submit in order to assert and support any claim against Mallinckrodt.
- Proofs of Claim should be submitted to Mallinckrodt's claims agent, Prime Clerk, and actually received by Prime Clerk before February 16, 2021 (or April 12, 2021 for governmental entities).
- Each Proof of Claim must be signed by the creditor or by an authorized agent of the creditor if the creditor is not an individual. You should attach to each claim any documents on which the claim is based or an explanation as to why such documents are not available.

### 5. Do I have a claim? What is my claim?

- If you believe you are owed money by Mallinckrodt for something other than opioids from prior to October 12, 2020, you may have a claim subject to the upcoming Bar Date.
- It is important to note that the General Bar Date of February 16, 2021 (or April 12, 2021 for governmental entities) does not apply to opioid claims. Opioid claims will be addressed through a separate process.
- We cannot provide advice as to whether you have a claim. You may wish to contact legal counsel. Please do not contact the Company for this information.

### 6. Do I need to file a Proof of Claim?

- If you believe that you have a non-opioid claim that arose before October 12, 2020 that has not been paid, you should consider filing a Proof of Claim.
- If you do not file a Proof of Claim, you may be bound by the claim amount, if any, provided in these [schedules](#). You do not need to file a Proof of Claim if you believe the amount in these schedules is accurate and the claim is not listed as contingent, unliquidated, or disputed.
- In accordance with the Bar Date order, certain individuals or entities do not need to file a Proof of Claim. Those exemptions are listed in the Bar Date order.
- It is important to note that the General Bar Date of February 16, 2021 (or April 12, 2021 for governmental entities) does not apply to opioid claims. Opioid claims will be addressed through a separate process.

### 7. I received a Proof of Claim form but it was already filled out. Do I need to amend this form or file a new claim?

- For certain parties, including some suppliers and vendors, Proof of Claim forms were personalized with prepetition scheduled liability amounts.
- If you agree with the amount listed on the pre-printed form and if it is not listed as contingent, unliquidated, or disputed, you do not need to file a claim form.
- If you believe the amount listed on the claim form has been paid pursuant to relief granted by the court to pay certain claims, you do not need to file a claim form.
- If, on the other hand, you disagree with the amount and/or it is listed as contingent, unliquidated or disputed, you must file a claim by the General Bar Date of February 16, 2021 (or April 12, 2021 for governmental entities).

### 8. Can I submit a Proof of Claim after the Bar Date?

- The General Bar Date in the Chapter 11 case is February 16, 2021 (or April 12, 2021 for governmental entities).
- It is up to the Bankruptcy Court to determine how any late-filed claims will be treated [in accordance with applicable law](#).
- Claims received after the Bar Date will be processed and docketed, but may be subject to objection and ultimately to disallowance.

### 9. Can I amend a claim after the Bar Date?

- The General Bar Date in the Chapter 11 case is February 16, 2021 (or April 12, 2021 for governmental entities).
- Prime Clerk will process claim amendments received after this date. It is up to the Bankruptcy Court to determine how claim amendments received after the Bar Date will be treated in accordance with applicable law.

### 10. I did not receive a Bar Date Notice. How can I obtain one?

- The Chapter 11 process requires the distribution of certain documents and notices that provide information about Mallinckrodt's restructuring.
- These notices, including the one you received, are being sent to a wide range of Mallinckrodt's stakeholders, including vendors, employees and customers, among others.
- You should review your own records to determine whether you have a connection to Mallinckrodt and whether you have a claim arising before October 12, 2020.
